I am writing you as Head of the Social Psychology Program at Howard University. We have a tenure-track opening for a social psychologist to start in January or August of 1994. Because Howard University is a historically Black University, with only two social psychologists at the present, both of whom are white, we are very interested in recruiting an African American for the position. I would be particularly interested in finding someone whose interests are in Health Psychology or Organizational Psychology, with a focus on issues that affect African Americans. The level is flexible; what is more important is the individual's commitment to and quality of teaching and research. I will be available to meet with interested persons at the APA meetings in Toronto, so would appreciate an early reply from you or the person you would recommend.

I'm also writing as Principal Investigator of the Howard University Women's Life Paths Study. This survey of women graduates from Howard University is being funded by a three year grant from the National Institute of Mental Health. In addition, we have received a supplemental grant from NIMH to support a postdoctoral researcher, for which I am also recruiting. This must be an ethnic minority person, and preferably an African American woman, because of the nature of the research. Please post the enclosed flyer for this position, and let me know if you know of anyone who would be appropriate and interested in this position as well. Again, I would like to use the opportunity of the convention in Toronto to meet anyone interested in applying.
