### CUT-BACK OF GRADUATE PROGRAM

At Queens College in mid-March, a memorandum was issued directing Chair-persons to cut back on their graduate programs. Specifically: Sections with four, five, or six students will simply be eliminated. Sections below thirty-five will be increased to that level. Required graduate courses will be limited to three.

On whom does the budgetary axe not fall? United political action by faculty and students is a necessity. We need one collective bargaining unit, not the L.C.'s two or C.U.N.Y.'s three, but ONE unit, as advocated by the U.F.C.T.
